

PROTOCOL FOR DOGS, CATS & FERRETS EXPOSED TO RABIES



- 1. Dog, cat or ferret bites, is bitten by, or is otherwise exposed to an animal reasonably suspected of being rabid. An exposure occurs when saliva or neural tissue from a rabid animal is introduced into a fresh open wound, scratch or onto a mucous membrane.
- Current rabies vaccination means the dog, cat or ferret was vaccinated more than 28 days prior to
 the exposure, if it was the animal's initial rabies vaccination (NC GS 130A-197), or for subsequent
 rabies vaccinations current means the animal was vaccinated according to vaccine manufacturer's
 recommendations and has a valid current rabies certificate.
- 3. If the exposed dog, cat or ferret is not revaccinated within 5 days, per NC GS 130A-197 the animal is not currently vaccinated.
- 4. If mammal is unavailable for testing, proceed as if the results were positive for rabies.
- 5. In accordance with NC General Statute 130A-197
